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President's letter

Dear Chaminade Family,

A few years ago, the *Harvard Business Review* had an article entitled, "Stop email overload."

It caught my eye because I, like most of you, I am sure most of you, often feel swamped by email. I purposely do not have a Facebook account, personal Instagram account, or Twitter account...I don't want something else to which I have to "answer" other than email. Email is enough.

Don't get me wrong...I love email. It is a great way to communicate most things and it is efficient, documented, and easy. And, what I like most about email is that it allows anyone to communicate something to me... even if I do not know them.

Let me share with you some emails I have received this year. These emails reinforce "why" all of us are part of the mission of Chaminade High School.

You probably don't remember me, but thanks to you, I graduated from Chaminade in 2000.

When I attended Chaminade, I wasn't too fond of going to school, and senior year, you caught me forging a late note. Instead of disciplining me in a way that pushed me further away from Chaminade, and school in general, you gave me an "in-school" suspension for a week. This meant I had

to go to school for a whole week straight, something I don't think I had done since freshman year. You even told me I could go lay down in the nurse's office if I needed to once I was there, but I had to actually be there in the building.

Thinking back, had you handled that situation differently, with a regular suspension or expulsion, I most likely would have dropped out completely or ended up in public school with friends that could have led me down a very different path in life.

I am very appreciative for the foundation I received from Chaminade, no matter how much I fought it at the time. Even more so, I appreciate you recognizing a better way to deal with an angry, rebellious, depressed 18-year-old kid and helping at a crucial time in my life.

This email reinforced why we began our Bloomberg Business program:

Dear Bro. Tom,

I wanted to share some good news with you.

Recently, I was one of several students selected to volunteer at the dedication of Maloney Hall at The Catholic University of America. This is the new home of the Busch School of Business. I was asked to showcase the functionality of the new Bloomberg Business Terminals in the finance lab.

I received an email from my finance professor over spring break, asking if I could assist him with the grand opening of the new building. As background, earlier in the semester he asked if any of the students in

our class were certified to work the terminals. Only a fellow Flyer and I raised our hands. We explained the training and the certification we received at Chaminade. My teacher remembered this, and in his email he asked if either one of us were able to help out.

So, thanks to the vision you and the faculty have brought to the students at Chaminade, we are certainly prepared for "real life" after high school. The Bloomberg training we received has already proven to be truly valuable. It allowed me to help at CUA (and in fact I am the first student to make a Bloomberg account at Catholic).

I am grateful for the head start Chaminade provided me with the Bloomberg tech and I can only imagine how prepared our future Flyers will be in STEM now that the Dolan Family Science, Technology, and Research Center is up-and-running.

Thank you for all the opportunities Chaminade has given my classmates and me. I hope that more Flyer grads will have opportunities just like the one I had.

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Class of 2019 graduation

The Chaminade Class of 2019 graduated on Sunday, June 2 at the Tilles Center for the Performing Arts on the campus of LIU Post. 408 graduates have gone on to pursue degrees at 128 institutions. These Chaminade men earned 2,601 scholarships and grants; 374 students received one or more scholarships or merit-based grants. Five students were named National Merit Scholarship finalists and 20 were honored as commended students. Six Chaminade students were recognized in the National Hispanic Scholar Recognition Program. Four graduates answered a call to serve and will respectively attend the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy, the U.S. Military Academy, and the U.S. Naval Academy.

“Be an example to all believers in what you say, in the way you live, in your love, your faith, and your purity.” 1 Tim 4:12

I must confess that I came across this quote from the first letter of St. Paul to Timothy while proofing the Parents Club ad for your yearbook. So when you get your yearbook, act surprised. I do believe that St. Paul sums up most aptly the past four years as you go forth on your life journey.

As a Christian, Paul reminds us that, first and foremost, we are called to be witnesses. Four years ago, as you entered the halls of Chaminade, or might I say, the campus of Chaminade, you began a long process of being formed into the Chaminade Man, who “does the right thing at the right time because it is the right thing to do, regardless of who is watching.” Now, as you go forth, you will be challenged to put that motto into practice, to be a witness to others of what the Chaminade Man is. You are called to be a witness of faith in a godless world, a witness of life in a culture of death, a witness of love in a world of hate, a witness of peace in a world of war and division, a witness of hope in a world of despair.

Second, Paul reminds you that your witness will not be just in words, in all that you say. More importantly and more profoundly, you will bear witness by the way you live, by who you are. The witness of your life will make more of a difference than just the words you say. As my father would remind us, his children, “Talk is cheap. Actions speak louder than words!” Never forget that your actions, your very life, will serve as a witness to others of the Good News that Jesus Christ has given to each of you. The way you live, the love you share, the mercy you express, will be a reflection of the love and mercy of God.

For the past four years you have had ample opportunity to learn, nurture and demonstrate this love and service to others. Whether in homeroom, activities, sports, chapel or just in the halls, you have served as a witness to the Gospel. Now, go forth and share that witness with the world.

The Chaminade Man believes that love, faith, and purity are his trademarks, embodying Paul’s words. This world needs you to bear witness to these Gospel virtues. You will face many challenges in doing so. My prayer is that the lessons you learned at Chaminade will make you an example of love, faith, and purity – reflecting the light of God where it is most needed.





Together in His name

Province joins thousands for World Youth Day

The global Church convened in Panama City in January to celebrate World Youth Day. More than 40 Chaminade students joined classmates from Kellenberg Memorial High School on a pilgrimage to pray with young Catholics from many different countries. According to the *Catholic News Service*, some 113,000 pilgrims registered for events held Tuesday, Jan. 22 through Sunday, Jan. 27.

As the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops explains, World Youth Day is important for three reasons: first, celebrating and putting trust in the young; second, making pilgrim-

age; and third, encountering the Catholic community. Chaminade students started attending World Youth Day in 2000 in Rome and continued with trips to Toronto in 2002; Cologne, Germany in 2005; Sydney in 2008; Madrid in 2011; Rio de Janeiro in 2013; and Krakow, Poland in 2016.

Larry Shammass '19 was on the pilgrimage to Panama and shares his experience.

I was jolted awake at 1 a.m. as my alarm blared next to my head. I checked a final time that my bags were totally packed as I readied myself for my first trip out of the U.S. I met

the rest of the pilgrims on my early morning flight at Kellenberg Memorial High School, where we said our final goodbyes and took some pre-trip pictures. After about 12 hours of flights and layovers, we finally stepped foot in Panama, where we were immediately greeted by applause and smiles from native Panamanian Catholics. They shook our hands, high-fived us, and greeted us with signs reading inspiring messages such as, "God Loves His Pilgrims!" or "Welcome to Panama brothers and sisters!"

At this point we were still a little less than a week away from when the Pope would actually

arrive in Panama, but the country was already energized with the Catholic faith. Billboards showed images of the Pope and the phrase ¡Bienvenidos Peregrinos! which the more linguistically inclined members of the group quickly told me meant Welcome Pilgrims! I hadn't been in the country more than an hour and I already felt at home.

We reached the first of two hotels we would be staying in for our pilgrimage outside of Panama City. For the next few days we spent time getting to relax and bond with both the Chaminade and Kellenberg pilgrims, some of whom I knew, many of whom I was meeting for the first time. As we awaited the arrival of Pope Francis, we had several incredible adventures. The first of which was a tour of the Panama Canal, complete with going through the world-famous locks. This "bucket list" event was quickly followed by a trip into the Gamboa Rainforest and a boat ride to Monkey Island, where we saw first-hand the natural beauty of the country.

The following day, we reached our next hotel. On the trip between hotels, we stopped in a lovely Panamanian market where we got a chance to test our Spanish speaking skills as well as purchase souvenirs for ourselves and our families. While I am not a particularly gifted Spanish speaker as a Latin student at Chaminade, several Spanish V

students were having fluent conversations.

The next day, now five days into the trip, was the day for which we had all been waiting. World Youth Day had officially begun with the Opening Mass, which was celebrated by the Archbishop of Panama. The Mass was preceded by a few hours of singing and dancing with pilgrims from all over the world. We traded American paraphernalia for foreign mementos; the most prized for me was a small plush koala bear from the Australian pilgrims. When the Mass finally started, it was like nothing I had ever seen before. This celebration of the Eucharist was truly a celebration, complete with excited and catchy songs in several languages, many of which were stuck in my head for the remainder of the pilgrimage.

The next day was the first day in Panama's Old City, where we celebrated our own Mass with special guest Bishop Robert Brennan. The church in which we had this Mass was from the 16th century, but still held onto much of its original architecture and beauty. After spending some more time in the Old City, we traveled to an English-speaking convention, where we heard several talks from religious and lay people alike, as well as some music. One singer was able to get every person in the center on their feet as we sang and danced along while she gave us instructions. This specific singer will remain in my memory for as long as I live, even though I don't believe she ever introduced herself or gave her name! The evening culminated with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and a talk from Bishop Robert Barron, famous for his World on Fire YouTube channel and website, and a personal favorite Catholic speaker of mine.

Pope Francis arrived in Panama while we were at the convention, so we did not have a chance to see him until the next day. After giving an excellent introductory speech, he hopped in the Popemobile. We ran from street to street looking for him, unsure of his route, and finally saw the flashing lights of his motorcade. The elation

which quickly rose from the crowd is almost indescribable – people were hopping on their friends' shoulders, others were praying, others were crying tears of joy. This would be one of three times I saw the Pope during the course of the trip, and it wasn't even the closest I got to him, but it was certainly the most impactful due to the sheer volume of people there with us.

The following days were spent on Church tours throughout the Old City and watching a vigil presided over by the Pope himself, as well listening to a moving speech from the Pontiff on the importance of young people in the world. I was lucky enough to go on a small excursion with Bros. Timothy and Kenneth as well as one Kellenberg student to visit the Cathedral of Panama City, which had been previously closed to the public when we were on our group church tour. Our final full day was spent watching the Pope celebrate the Closing Mass of World Youth Day and announcing Lisbon, Portugal as the location of the next World Youth Day. After this we celebrated our own closing Mass which was followed by a day of relaxation and mingling.

While World Youth Day is all about getting to know young Catholics from all around the world, I found the most enriching introductions took place at the dinner tables. Whether I was finally meeting someone I have gone to school with for the past four years, or a totally new face from Kellenberg, I was making new friends every night. This pilgrimage was both incredibly spiritually uplifting as well as socially refreshing for someone like me, who would not necessarily be labeled as a "social butterfly." We were able to spend hours upon hours hanging out with each other, whether it was during the excitement of an official World Youth Day event or a Province of Meribah specific event. I am incredibly lucky to have had the opportunity to go on this trip, not only because it was my first international trip, but because of the spiritual and social benefits I was awarded. I will always remember the experiences I had as well as the friends I met and the relationships I grew.

Sports, science, and service

It's an issue that has been growing in prominence on social media and in politics: trash, particularly plastic, in our environment. You've likely seen the photos of its impact on wildlife and shorelines. New York State looks to ban single-use plastic bags; Suffolk County businesses currently charge five cents per bag if you don't bring your own to the store. The nonprofit World Economic Forum predicts there will be more plastic than fish in the ocean by 2050. Chaminade men are doing their part to understand and clean up the waters that surround us.

Chaminade's crew team, which practices from the Town of North Hempstead's Bar Beach, assisted with cleanup Friday, May 3. It's a ritual now several years in the making, when students trade boats for black bags and pack them with all the rubbish they can find.

"When we're out on the water at practice or a regatta, our teammates always pick up the litter they see," said Mr. John Callinan '84, Chaminade's assistant principal of athletics and campus activities and varsity crew coach. "The land around our launch is almost like a basin, and litter collects there. We want to pay it forward, give back where we spend so much of our time, and keep the water clean for future generations."

Students interested in oceanography once again traveled to the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution (WHOI) on Cape Cod in May. They toured the workshops and docks and saw the personnel sphere of the Alvin submersible vehicle. They also explored the REMUS underwater vehicle lab and gathered water and organism samples on a research vessel. A presentation on the impact of microplastic and nanoplastics brought added meaning to what our students learned and saw on the water. WHOI researchers are currently investigating whether something as small as a bead inside toothpaste – the bead is plastic – ever fully decomposes, as well as the cycle of consumption from fish to humans and back. WHOI estimates eight million tons of plastics enter the ocean each year, but only one percent can be seen on the surface.

Scott Gallagher, chair of the WHOI Microplastics Initiative, explained that WHOI has collected scallops with traces of microplastics in their guts. Though the collections came off Cape Cod, it raises eyebrows here at home. Long Islanders don't just make a good meal out of Peconic Bay scallops – it's how some make a living. Researchers know microbes live on microplastics and may pose health risks to those who consume them.

Junior Nicholas Donatelli was on the WHOI trip. "Having grown up on Long Island," he explained, "I think learning about microplastics and their harmful effects on the ocean and wildlife is extremely important. We need to be aware of what is polluting our ocean, the damage it can cause, and what we as a community can do to help change this problem."

Aside from fish, WHOI is examining where else plastics go when they enter the ocean. In May, American explorer Victor Vescovo broke a record for the deepest sea dive. He explored the bottom of the Mariana Trench in the western Pacific Ocean; at seven miles below the surface, it is the deepest location in the world. In addition to new kinds of crustaceans, BBC News reports, Vescovo discovered something else – a plastic bag and some candy wrappers.

Back here on land, Emmaus volunteers routinely participate in clean-up projects on Long Island, including one on the shore in the Town of Babylon. Chaminade stopped using plastic plates and utensils in the cafeteria more than a decade ago. Students are encouraged to use water-purifying fountains adjacent to Ott Field and in the cafeteria. As the *Chaminade News* went to print, the cafeteria fountain has registered 155,238 water bottles saved since it was installed three years ago.

Chaminade's crew team makes an annual appointment to clean up Bar Beach, where team practices are held.




Roll Flyers!

team. They catapulted the Flyers to their eighth straight Catholic League title in February. Taking on St. John the Baptist, Team A got out to an early lead in Game 1. Meanwhile, Team B trailed for most of the game, but snatched victory from their opponents in the final frame to go up by 30 pins. The Cougars came roaring back in Game 2, winning over our Team A by 15 pins, while Team B was able to add to their pin total.

With the score at 3-to-1, there was still work to be done, and the Flyers elevated their game. They averaged 215 pins per man during the final game to leave no doubt and hoist the league championship trophy for the eighth consecutive year. The Flyers have won 31 straight matches, are undefeated over the

last 64, and have a cumulative record of 112-1 with one tie over an eight year span.

Paul shot a 224 in Game 1 of a 615 series; AJ shot a 246 in Game 2 of a 645 series; Christian Freel '20 shot a 256 in Game 1 of a 659 series; Matt shot a 253 in Game 3 of a 691 series; and Marcus Alaimo '20 was named tournament MVP, shooting a 258 in Game 1 of a 708 series.

"Some teams never get the excitement of winning one championship," Paul explained. "To say that every February for the last four years we got to lift a championship trophy is incredibly special."

Are the pins placed in favor of a ninth season title? The Flyers are optimistic.

"We are graduating a talented group of seniors who have offered exceptional leadership throughout this season," said Coach Terence Fitzgibbon '00. "Their presence on the team will be missed, but we have rising talent that we are excited to see fill in the roles of the departing seniors."

Honoring our founders

Longtime staff members celebrated

Robert Casella, Bro. Richard Hartz, S.M. '59, and Lurdes (Maria) Mendes were honored as Founders of Chaminade High School at the annual Founders Dinner Thursday, Jan. 31. Among the highest honors given to a member of the Chaminade Family, the Founders Award is presented to individuals who have exemplified the school's mission – their dedication has been outstanding in the continuous advancement of the Chaminade mission.

Recipients range from faculty and staff members, parents, alumni, alumni parents, grandparents, and friends. The Founders Award is a special recognition which reminds us that Chaminade is the work of many, and we stand on the foundation poured by those before us.

ROBERT CASELLA

Especially in recent years, the Chaminade campus has become something of a small city. Any municipality has a good infrastructure manager. Bob Casella is ours.

When he started as a mechanic in September 1991, he recalled, "All we had was a school and a garage on the corner!" Bob maintained and repaired the school's fleet of vehicles – including some you might not expect. He remembers a time he had to drive from Kellenberg Memorial to Chaminade on a Ford tractor – the kind you'd more likely see on a dirt road than Old Country Road.

"I was driving this tractor through the middle of Nassau County, on busy roads, past the courthouses," he said with a smile. "I thought, 'what am I doing?'"

The longer Bob was here, more facilities were added to the school campus. His background made him perfectly suited to take over as maintenance director and facilities manager in 2003. He applied his knowledge of automobile repair to solve problems on a larger scale – correcting electrical or air-conditioning issues, for instance. There are now more than 20 members of the maintenance staff Bob coordinates; in the early days of his career here, there were six or seven.

Bob has also shared his family with ours. Bob's wife, Judy, was a mainstay on the cafeteria staff for 21 years. Although Judy passed away in January, her spirit will remain with us always. Judy and Bob's son, Joseph, graduated from Chaminade in 2001.

Every day is different, Bob said. And he loves that about his work. It is fitting for Bob to be named a founder of Chaminade High School – his work keeps it up-and-running.

Bob reflected, "Chaminade has been great to me. I've tried to do the same for them."

BRO. RICHARD HARTZ, S.M. '59

He had a route delivering the *Long Island Daily Press* before getting a job at the A&P. Richard Hartz was stocking shelves, ringing up groceries at the checkout, and paying his own way through high school.

"I didn't know much about Chaminade before I took the entrance exam," he remembered. "I do know Our Lady wanted me to come here."

After graduating in 1959, he followed the Blessed Mother's call into the Society of Mary.

Bro. Richard took his first vows in 1960. He taught German and, in 1978, began working with the Alumni Association. He added director of development to his responsibilities in 1994.

"I was able to teach young men and then get to know them as mature adults," Bro. Richard said. "My role has allowed me to do that. It's been a wonderful experience."

For many years, Bro. Richard was the reason many of us knew what was going on at school. He moderated the Photo Service, edited the *Chaminade News*, and spoke to thousands of alumni at events from Long Island to California. All of that allowed Bro. Richard to know, and be known by, much of the Chaminade Family. In fact, he is the longest-tenured faculty member in the school's history.

One could not imagine Chaminade without Bro. Richard. The school may also credit many of its programs and projects to his fundraising work. Since the Torch Fund's inception in 1987, more than \$30 million has been passed back to families in the form of tuition abatement.

A founder of Chaminade High School in every sense, Bro. Richard considers his time with us, "a marvelous grace."

LURDES (MARIA) MENDES

Meals bring families together. Whether we're celebrating a special occasion, discussing a challenge, or simply catching up, there's often a table between us. Twenty-five years ago this month, Lurdes (Maria) Mendes started

preparing meals in the Chaminade kitchen. "What I remember about that time is how I felt welcomed into the family right away," she said. "The brothers and I cooked together for a few school events, and we made a great team."

It wasn't long before Maria's responsibilities grew from feeding students in the Courtyard Café to managing supplies for every on-campus event. Maria is a familiar face during and after school to students, parents, and the entire Chaminade Family.

She laughed, saying, "We've known each other a long time!" One of Maria's staple servings is her smile. She loves seeing Chaminade's young men every day and reconnecting with them years later at events. Her own son, Daniel, sat at the family table as a student, graduating from Chaminade in 2007. It's not

This is one of my favorites:

Today, I was taking my parents to lunch. My father is 87 years old and uses a cane and is not too steady on his feet. My mom and I were helping him out of the car when

a young man with a Chaminade sweat-shirt came running over and asked us if we needed any help. He was genuinely kind, thoughtful, and compassionate. When he left, my mom commented, "Did you see his sweatshirt? It said Chaminade." I'm sorry to say I didn't get his name, but I felt compelled to let you know that your "brand ambassador" is out in the world representing your school with dignity and kindness. Thank you!

Why am I sharing these with all of you? I guess I just always want to make sure that you, the entire Chaminade Family, know that our shared mission, our passion to provide the very best Catholic high school experience, does not fall on deaf ears. Sometimes we mess up, stumble, or down-right get it wrong. But I am confident to say that most of the time we do get it right, because what we do here on Jackson Ave. each day is a shared responsibility. No one person is responsible for what takes place at Chami-

nade...it is a collaborative work, a story that gets written each day!

Walt Whitman concludes one of his poems in *Leaves of Grass* with this line:

That the powerful play goes on, and you may contribute a verse.

Far flung Flyers Alumni land work overseas

Flyers have followed their passions and professional careers to many foreign countries.

Ed Yap '06 is the senior policy advisor to the treasurer of New South Wales, Australia (NSW). The region is the economic and population center of the country. 34 percent of its gross domestic product and 32 percent of its population come from NSW. If the state were a corporation, it would be Australia's largest, with more than US\$360 billion in total assets, nearly US\$200 billion in net worth, a US\$60 billion annual budget, and more than 325,000 employees. Ed advises the treasurer on areas including education, trade and investment, energy, the environment, natural resources, state-owned corporations, and insurance.

"On an average day, I need to be as comfortable navigating spreadsheets as navigating boardroom lunches with executives, fielding calls from internal and external stakeholders, and taking on and finding solutions to some of the most contentious and vexed public policy problems," Ed explained.

The opportunity to broaden his personal and professional interests made the move "down under" easy for Ed. He had worked in politics and government in five states, on Capitol Hill, and with a consulting firm in Washington, D.C. He met his fiancé, Michelle, in Australia. They will marry in the Philippines next month. In addition to visiting all corners of Australia, Ed has traveled to several different Southeast Asian countries.

Since 2014, Ed has immersed himself fully into the community.

"Over the last few years I've helped the treasurer run a program which brings high school seniors from Sydney's suburbs to the middle of Outback Australia to do service work in Aboriginal communities. We've brought nearly 100 young men and women to work in the sweltering summer desert heat, repairing and repainting three schools, to learn alongside local Aboriginal students. Those service projects reminded me of service projects I did as a student at Chaminade more than a decade ago."

Ed believes an appreciation for servant leadership followed him from Chaminade to Sydney.

"Chaminade taught me to always listen, respect others' points of view, and have a constructive dialogue despite genuine differences of opinion. That's a lesson I've always tried to carry with me – and it's a lesson that's more relevant now than ever before."

Meanwhile, Morgan O'Brien '97 "caught the bug" for overseas work as a public affairs officer for the U.S. Air Force, deployed to the Middle East in 2003 and Rwanda in 2006. Today, he serves as a press attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, a post he holds with the U.S. Department of State. He credits his interest in foreign service to his Chaminade education.

"My transition to the military and then to diplomacy is a natural extension of what the brothers and faculty modeled for us during our four years in Mineola," Morgan explained. "At Chaminade, we learn that Catholic means universal, and I've found that to be a true

and reassuring part of life overseas. Wherever I've been, the universality of the church has provided comfort. It's tough being so far away from your family and loved ones, but every Sunday, I know that I'm celebrating the same Mass as my parents or, when I'm on a solo assignment, my wife."

One overseas tour brought Morgan to the Republic of Congo and, as luck should have it, he discovered a school named Lycée Chaminade near his residence. Morgan helped to facilitate a clothing donation for the Marianist school from Chaminade and Kellenberg Memorial. As a graduate, he still felt a responsibility to reflect Chaminade's values.

Morgan said, "We represented the institution and it wasn't enough to simply succeed – we were to do so with class and character. It's easy to draw a parallel to how I use those lessons on a daily basis when I represent American values abroad today."

Italo Zanzi '92 is currently executive vice president and managing director of sports for Asia Pacific and the Middle East for the Fox Networks Group. He joined the company from Italian Serie A football club Roma, where he was CEO. At Chaminade, Zanzi was a captain on the soccer team, sports editor for *Tarmac*, and president of the Statisticians Club – all activities one would find particularly useful in sports.

Zanzi holds a leadership role in a business that is evolving quicker by the day. Traditional media is continuously adapting to changing consumer habits. Zanzi embraces the trend and the diversified opportunities it



presents. In a 2018 interview with the *Huffington Post*, Italo said technology, content, and local sports were poised to drive sports entertainment in Asia.

“For many fans, the real value of sports isn’t just the game – it’s the story behind it,” Italo told *Huffington Post* digital marketing specialist Herbert Sim. “Concise, compelling, differentiated content brings games to life; giving new fans the context they need to understand what’s happening on the field, and giving diehard sports fans more avenues

to experience and share their passion.”

Another 1992 graduate, Daniel Melley, calls London home. The head of Europe, Middle East, and Africa institutional sales for Putnam Investments, Dan oversees sales and consultant relations for Putnam in these regions.

“Dan volunteered to go to the UK for a year when he was working for another company,” his father, Steve, told the *Chaminade News*. “Well, one year turned into 20!” Father and son see each other in person at least once a year, whether Steve flies across

the Atlantic or Dan and his family come back to Long Island. Technology helps bridge the gap; Dan calls his dad at least once a week, and Skype allows Steve to see his son and grandchildren.

“We still talk about Chaminade,” Steve said. “His years there were very full. The training he got at Chaminade prepared him well for his life today.”

Medicine in the Caribbean

Graduate studies medical care in Cuba

Only since March 2016 have Americans been able to travel on their own to Cuba. For decades, U.S. citizens were banned from visiting the island nation roughly 100 miles from the Florida Keys. Loosened restrictions have increased interest in Cuba's politics and culture. Nick O'Malley '15, a recent pre-med

graduate from St. Joseph's University, visited Cuba as part of his Just Health Care in Developing Nations program. Twelve students and two professors joined Nick on the trip to assess Cuba's

government-run healthcare system and share components of healthcare in the United States.

In the capital city of Havana, Nick toured an orthopedic hospital and discussed with medical professionals differences in care and technology between Cuba and the U.S.

"People often have polarizing opinions about Cuba," Nick said, "but we noticed some great advantages and limitations in the country's healthcare system. For instance, doctors still make routine house calls, especially for pregnant women. There's a strong emphasis on primary care, so doctors can catch conditions in their early stages. Senior

citizens appear to be in good care with access to government centers.

"In some cases, their outcomes are better despite having fewer resources."

Nick noticed a significant difference, especially in technology, while visiting a rural clinic near the Bay of Pigs.

"The defibrillator had no batteries and was hard-wired," Nick recalled. "That creates an extra obstacle during an emergency. Staff members were also washing rubber gloves and hanging them up to dry so they could be reused." There were also fewer specialists to handle more advanced medical cases. In spite of that, and a lack of modern technology, Nick believed Cuba's general practitioners had very well-honed diagnostic skills.

"Cuba is a beautiful country, and the people are wonderful, too," Nick said. "People do get nervous, though, when you ask them a lot of questions. Wi-Fi is brand new to Cuba and may only be found in public spaces. Some social media sites remained blocked. Any American tourist must be accompanied by a guide if they wish to explore outside of Havana."

In February, Cubans voted for the first constitutional reforms since 1976. The Associated Press reports there is hope for social and economic changes, but there is speculation

over the speed and breadth of those changes. The Communist Party remains in power in Cuba, and the country is currently making headlines for its allegiance to Venezuelan President Nicolas Maduro and increased U.S. sanctions.

"The trip offered me perspective on what medicine is and how I want to practice it," Nick said. "A huge part of why I want to be a doctor is because of the teachers at Cham-inade. As Catholics, we're called to use our abilities to help people who may not have the same advantages we have. As a PREP teacher, I went out into the community with my classmates to teach religion. We try to put others before ourselves."

Next year, Nick will complete a one-year bioethics program at Columbia University and work on the spinal research team with NYU Langone Health. After medical school, he will pursue a career in family medicine, pediatrics, or obstetrics and gynecology.

Leaving a legacy

1953 graduate gives Chaminade's largest bequest

Accepting, pragmatic, care-free, loving. What wonderful words by which to be known. They are the words Maura Ahearn chose to describe her father, Robert, who graduated from Chaminade in 1953.

"Dad always spoke very fondly of Chaminade," Maura said. "He may not have been the best student, but he valued his time in high school and the relationships he made there."

When Robert passed away on Oct. 11, 2018, he wished that much of his estate be left to nonprofits – half of which to Chaminade. With a gift of more than \$305,000, it is the largest bequest the school has ever received.

Maura and her sister, Kerry Vander Welt, asked their father to write some of his memories in the later years of his life. They included memories of his childhood with six brothers and sisters in Oyster Bay and his Chaminade education. Bro. John Darby, S.M., was the principal of Chaminade when Robert was a student and served as one of his leading mentors. Robert wrote of a history teacher who, "really inspired me to do well."

"These notes remind us that his early and formative life was positively shaped by a strong family, faith, and a superior education," Maura explained.


After attending St. John's and St. Bonaventure Universities, Robert married Patricia and went on to a career with Herff Jones in Indianapolis. It is the same company that manufactures Chaminade's class rings. He left the company at age 55 but wasn't done working. Robert became an investment advisor for

Planned Investment Company, Inc., also in Indianapolis, to help people structure their retirement portfolios. Involved in the community, Robert volunteered with Habitat for Humanity and SCORE – described by Maura as an organization dedicated to helping underserved young people achieve a college education. After his wife passed away, Robert spent his final years with his daughters in Oregon. His work took him away from Long Island, but a part of him remained here.

"Dad took a lot of good advice from his Chaminade teachers to the next phases of his life," Maura said.

Through the bequest, Robert leaves a legacy with a direct impact on Chaminade students.

"It is our hope that this money from our parents' estate helps Chaminade continue to give young adults the brightest future possible," Maura and Kerry explained. "Thank you to all the educators and staff that have made Chaminade great – in the past, in the present, and in the future."
